


It's one of, if not the most common question about Provincetown. How did it come to have such a large LGBTQ+ population as well as become an important locale in LGBTQ+ history, culture, and politics? In short, why is Provincetown so gay? That's rather a long story. Provincetown has had a rebellious streak from the beginning. In the early 1700s, the law in the Massachusetts Bay colony required all towns to have a minister. Provincetown refused. From then on, the town at the tip of the Cape not only embraced an anti-authoritarian culture but also became a refuge for outsiders. However, the modern understanding of Provincetown as a special place for the LGBTQ+ community began in 1899 when Charles Hawthorne founded the Cape Cod School of Art, giving birth to the Provincetown art colony. His school

particularly the women of Provincetown opened their homes to these students to make a little extra money. Over the next two decades, Provincetown welcomed not only thousands of artists, but also writers, actors and left-wing political radicals with new ideas on gender, racial equality, artistic expression and sexuality. These ideas were met by a local population that was already pushed to the fringes of American society, not only because the town itself was populated by outsiders for generations, but that the large working-class Portuguese community was facing discrimination on many fronts in the region. So began a symbiotic relationship that included a well-established LGBTQ+ community by the 1920s as well as a significant portion of the straight population as friends and allies. As news spread throughout the LGBTQ community nationwide that Provincetown was a place of relative freedom and acceptance, the town's gay population, as well as visitors, grew exponentially. So, too, began a growing backlash from more conservative elements in Provincetown as they examined ways to try and stop the influx of LGBTQ+ people. Clearly those efforts failed. Starting in the 1950s various businesses and entertainers

began to tip toe out of the closet so that by the Stonewall Riots of 1969 the town exploded with activism and visible queer expressions of art, culture, and politics leading to Provincetown earning a worldwide reputation as a LGBTQ+ safe haven. The 1970s would be a period of tremendous change. While the decade began with a concerted anti-gay backlash from town government, by the dawn of the 1980s, Town Hall was hosting sold out drag shows and one of the first performances by the disco phenomenon, the Village People. Provincetown has since continued to be synonymous with LGBTQ+ pride and stands as a supportive safe haven where all are welcome to be themselves.



There are plenty of free and affordable activities, theater, dining, art, and exploration to enjoy year-round. Here are a few of must-try favorites.

Art & Theater

Art Gallery Strolls & Feminist Stoop Readings

Friday nights in town are abuzz with late night activity, but especially in the East End, where the **Provincetown Art Association & Museum's (PAAM)** entry is free from 5-8pm. Many galleries often keep their doors open later into the evening on Fridays as well, inviting

you in with lively receptions and wine tastings. Womencrafts hosts Feminist Stoop Readings on Friday nights as well. For additional art events visit Provincetown Art Gallery Association and the Provincetown Arts Society.

Cody Plays

This community-driven theatre production calls the **Gifford House** home and offers a donation-based entry for their monthly Monday night shows.

Fine Art Works Center

The Fine Art Works Center hosts a variety of free, year-round, public programming, including Fellow Fridays, poetry readings, open mic nights, artist talks, and more.

Self-Guided Public Art Tour

Take a wander down the pier to view the **Provincetown Public Art Foundation's** newest murals and go exploring

for additional pieces they've recently commissioned around town.

Twenty Summers

Twenty Summers is a month-long festival in late Spring featuring a series of free and low-cost performances, installations, conversations, and workshops held in the Hawthorne Barn.

Breakfast

Start your day right at **Bagel Hound**, **Joe's Coffee**, or the **Portuguese Bakery**, where you can still walk away with a breakfast sandwich for less than \$8.

You'll be hard pressed to find a better deal any time of day than at **Bay Cafe!** Their wallet-friendly \$10 menus are available for breakfast, lunch, and dinner, including omelettes, French toast,

cheeseburger sliders, veggie potstickers, French dips, and more!

Lunch & Picnic Fare

For a bougie lunch, treat yourself to **Vorelli's** Kobe-style Wagyu beef burger for just \$18.95 or pack a beach picnic on a dime with tasty salads, sandwiches, and snacks from **Angel Foods**, **East End Market**, **Far Land Provisions**, and **Salty Market**.

Seafood Happy Hour

For a great deal on bivalves, don't miss Mac's Seafood, Red Inn, and Victor's. All three local hotspots offer seafood-focused happy hours, including options like half-priced oysters, shrimp, and clams.

Dinner

Delicious fine dining for less can be enjoyed at Victor's on prix-fixe Mondays for just \$28 or any day of the week at Fanizzi's with a view! Fanizzi's Early Bird Dinners are served daily between 4:30-5:30pm for just \$20.99 and include options like fresh mussels over linguine, pan-seared salmon, and steak tips. Thursday nights are for 'All You Can Eat Fish & Chips' at Mac's Seafood from 4-8:30pm for a mere \$20.99.

Entertainment & Activities

Free Hidden Treasures

Two of the most unique hidden treasures of Provincetown include a half-scale replica of the Rose Dorothea Schooner built inside the Provincetown Library and available to enjoy for free during Library hours. In addition, you'll want to visit the off-the-beaten-path **Spinnaker Exhibit.** This impressive exhibit features a fully preserved skeleton of an 11-year old humpback whale, housed at the **Center for Coastal Studies**, open to the public Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, from 1-4pm or by appointment.

History With A View

The Pilgrim Monument and Provincetown Museum (PMPM) offers a great, low-cost cost and family-friendly attraction. The lobby museum is always free and features an exhibit on the complicated relationship between the Indigenous Wampanoag and the Mayflower Pilgrims, as well as an anecdotal LGBTQ+ history of the last century of Provincetown. Entry to the Monument itself is \$20, \$16 for Seniors, Veterans & Active Duty, and children (13-17). Children (4-12) are \$9, and a special adult joint package ticket is \$30, which includes entry to the PMPM and PAAM.

Live Shows & Karaoke

Many live shows sans cover charge can be found year-round and all over town in popular venues like **Tin Pan Alley**, the **Post Office Cabaret**, **Piano Bar** at the **Crown & Anchor**, and no visit to Provincetown is complete without a visit to Drag Queen Karaoke at the **Governor Bradford**.

Outdoor Adventures

Bike Trails & Beaches

Biking and hiking trails abound in the **National Seashore** and offer some of

the most spectacular coastal views and nature trails on Cape. Borrow or rent a bike from **Coast Provincetown** or **Ptown Bikes** and take the afternoon to explore everything from Boy Beach to the Beech Forest and Herring Cove to Race Point.

Hiking & Lighthouses

The Provincetown Causeway, or the 'Breakwater' as it is more commonly called by locals, is a must-visit attraction on the West End. You'll find the Breakwater rock wall jetting out into the bay from across First Landing Park. a site commemorating the arrival of the Pilgrims on the Cape in 1620. This causeway is just over a mile from the West End to the Wood End Lighthouse. and with no shade covering, this slightly challenging hike is best enjoyed with sunscreen protection, a water bottle, and proper footwear. Should you prefer to take in the views from a less strenuous vantage point, hop aboard the Long Point Shuttle operated by Flyer's Boat Rental for \$25 per person round-trip (cash only).

Sunrises & Sunsets to Remember

Provincetown's sunrises and sunsets are arguably among the most spectacular in the world. Why not enjoy them from a paddle board or kayak? **Coyote Kayak** offers incredible guided tours at all times of day, including a Salt Marsh Eco tour, Boy Beach Paddle, and daytime rentals starting at just \$30.

FIVE YEARS OF

When Juneteenth, also known as Juneteenth National Independence Day, became a federally recognized national holiday in 2021, Provincetown quickly embraced the celebration. Juneteenth, a combination of June and nineteenth referring to the date of the holiday, is a celebration of the full implementation of the Emancipation Proclamation when union soldiers informed enslaved people in Galveston, Texas that they were free, two and half years after President Abraham Lincoln signed the decree, effectively ending slavery in America. Now in its 5th year, the centerpiece of Provincetown's Juneteenth celebration is a community cookout on the lawn of the Unitarian Universalist Meeting House

open to all. But Provincetown continually explores the inter-

sectionality of identity
and community. As
such, Provincetown's
Juneteenth celebration
incorporates the art
colony, entertainment
scene, and the
LGBTQ+ community
as well as the Jamaican
population of the
Outer Cape. Past
celebrations have
included concerts

featuring James Jackson Jr., star of the Tony Award-winning Broadway musical A Strange Loop, beloved local drag queens, a queer BIPOC art show, and an exhibit featuring aspects of Provincetown's Black history and its legacy of Black artists and notable people who've made their mark in town like boxer Marvelous Marvin Hagler, Grace Jones, actress and comedian LaWanda Page, and drag artists like Sahdji and Bobbie Callicoatte.

While not official events of Provincetown's Juneteenth celebrations, the town is also host to Frolic (formerly Men of Melanin Magic), which will coincide with Juneteenth this year. This event welcomes queer men of color and their allies to Provincetown for a weekend of fun, community, and inclusivity. With a large Jamaican population, Juneteenth in Provincetown has a bit of a Caribbean flair, with Jamaican food and music playing a significant role in the celebration. And just as the Juneteenth celebration has become part of the Provincetown calendar, so too has Jamaican Independence Day, August 6, with its own community festival held in the Bas Relief Park behind Town Hall, featuring music, food, games, and plenty of good-time vibes.

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INTERVIEW WITH THE ARTIST:

Celeste, we are so excited to feature your artwork on the cover of this year's LGBTQ+ Guide to Good Times. Could you tell us a bit about yourself and where you grew up?

I grew up in Greenwich Village, where my mother owned a vintage clothing store for 40 years—O Mistress Mine. I spent every afternoon after school there in the early 1970s. I watched her and the seamstresses create and have fun sewing jean skirts and blouses made from the fabric of vintage dresses. Her customers were very colorful and unique. I learned so much about the history of fashion and have come to love everything vintage. This experience really influenced my aesthetic and who I am today.

What first brought you to Provincetown?

My college friends from UMass Amherst came to Provincetown every summer to work, so I went with them and got a job at what was then Cafe Blase, now the Patio. But my first memory of Provincetown was in 1969. [My family and I] drove up from NYC in my parents' Dodge Dart. I remember the tiny streets were packed. My parents had me sit for a caricature drawing of me with ice cream. Years later, at 20, I got my first small apartment on Court Street.

Who has most influenced your art and how?

My mother. Growing up around a vibrant, diverse community where my mother owned a vintage clothing store, simply being in that environment influenced my aesthetic. I often make nostalgic images, brightly colored, using vintage fabric and juvenile in style. I am very interested in how things look from being decayed, aged, and worn.

Also, the 15 years of teaching Kindergarteners ~ who taught me to have no fear. to just draw what you see, and as far as artists influences- it's a long list but I love Diane Arbus, Lisette Model, Andy Warhol, and Ben Shawn!

How would you describe your work?

My partner used to say that my work was interesting to take in because it's not "right". I don't think he was wrong about that!! There's always something a "little off", but in a good way.

What types of mediums do you enjoy working in?

I work with embroidery, printmaking, painting, drawing, and sculpture. I also make Barbie Bulbs, Christmas Ornaments with Barbie Doll heads on themed wreaths. I consider them mini-sculbtures.

And what are Shack Plagues?

They're small wooden stenciled paintings that I make with images of my favorite old school suntan and beauty products, Old

Spice, Coppertone, Bain de Soleil, etc., and occasionally some canned goods and spices, but Bain de Soleil is my all-time favorite product and most popular Shack Plaque. I loved everything about the "sunscreen", especially the smell and the fact that it's only SPF 4!

Where can visitors find more of your work this year?

I recently participated in the Winter Windows project, where a few of my pieces will be featured in the windows of the Ptown Bike Shop every winter. I'm also participating in the collage show titled 'Heresy: A Scrapbook of Rebellion' as part of Camp Provincetown's First Annual Outsiders Art Festival from April 30 - May 12, 2025, and I have a show at The Commons this summer from June 25 -Iuly 7, 2025.

25 YEARS OF BEAR WEEK IN PROVINCETOWN:



Twenty-five years ago, Provincetown found itself in a hairy situation. Long a crucible for LGBTQ+ thought and culture, Provincetown has welcomed all kinds of gueer subcultures to its shores over the years. In 2001, Provincetown hosted the very first Bear Week, the annual mid-July hirsute bacchanalia that celebrates the Bear community. While the Bear identity and subsequent culture began in San Francisco in the 1980s, it was in Provincetown that the most famous gathering began with a small group of Bears visiting town for a week at the invitation of John Burrows, the late founder of Bear Week and Ptown Bears. By its tenth anniversary, Bear Week attracted thousands of revelers from around the world, making it the premier

Bear event, a reputation that continues to this day.

Founded on the ideals of inclusivity, body positivity, sexual freedom, and community, Bear Week is more than just a good time. Bear Week revels in the come-as-you-are vibe of Provincetown, and as such, the Bears have a beloved reputation in town, reaching out beyond just its attendees and forming deep bonds with locals and other visitors alike. Arguably the largest event after Provincetown's famed Carnival in August, Bear Week offers everything from late-night parties to Bear-specific entertainment and drag shows to cozy lounge meetups and fine dining. Bear Week in Provincetown has cracked the mainstream, too,

becoming the topic of feature films and documentaries, books, countless news stories, and it's even been the inspiration for several songs. But most of all, Bear Week is about celebration, lifting each other up, and creating a space where everyone is welcome.





1952: Philip "Phil" Baiona, sometimes known by his drag name Bella Baiona, opens Weathering Heights on

1970: LGBTQ activists hold a Labor Day Solidarity March to honor the one-vear anniversary of Stonewall, despite being denied a parade permit by the town.



Townsend, who began his activism in Boston in the late 1930s, operated his home as a Bohemian flop house giving a place to crash to such people as poet and actor Rene Ricard, queer playwright Charles Ludlam, Mink Stole and John Waters.

1975: The first Fantasia Fair is held. Now known as Trans Week, it is the oldest continual transgender event in the world and a pioneer in transgender activism.

1978: The Provincetown Business Guild is founded, making it one of the oldest LGBTQ+ business associations in the country. That same year, the PBG presents the very first Carnival, now the town's signature event and the largest event on Cape Cod.

Glossary



Provincetown has such a unique and distinctive culture and flair. At times it can seem like it also has its own language! Perhaps it does. Here's a list of common slang and colloquialisms native to Provincetown to better understand life at the end of the Cape.

Augustitis - The first recorded use of this word dates back to the 1940s. For those that live and work in Provincetown, it refers to the summer stress experienced by locals who put in long hours. The condition is not fatal; it's nothing a daytrip to the beach can't cure.

Barking – The practice of "barking" is the old-school promotion of a live show. Come late afternoon in Town, comedians, drag queens, musicians, and others hit Commercial Street to "bark" for their shows and pass out flyers. If you're not interested in taking a flier, a smile and a "no thanks" is appreciated.

Boy Beach – Dating back to the 1950s, this is the longstanding nickname for the far-flung part of Herring Cove Beach that attracts many gay men, and now a growing number of the LGBTQ+ family. Though not technically allowed within the Cape Cod National Seashore, it is Provincetown's de facto nude beach.

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
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Glossary



Breakwater – The Provincetown Causeway, or the Breakwater as it is more commonly called by locals, is a must-visit attraction on the West End. Made of large boulders, this causeway stretches out for just over a mile from the West End to the Wood End Lighthouse.

Cape Cod Geography

Outer Cape – Provincetown, Truro, Wellfleet & Eastham

Lower Cape – Chatham, Orleans, Harwich & Brewster

Mid Cape – Dennis, Yarmouth & Barnstable
Upper Cape – Sandwich, Mashpee, Falmouth
& Bourne

Nice Boy – A term of endearment coined by mostly Portuguese women in Provincetown to refer to gay men. It was a way these women expressed affection and support to the young men who often boarded in their homes, which led to the important culture of guest houses in Provincetown.

Sapphic - Derived from the Greek poet, Sappho, of the Isle of Lesbos, sapphic is often used as an umbrella term to identify LGBTQ+ women and those they experience attraction to, whether they identify as lesbian, bisexual, queer, trans, masc, non-binary or any diverse identity.



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Tea – This is the shortened moniker for Tea Dance, the popular afternoon party at the Boatslip that's been a part of Provincetown since the late 1960s. You'll often hear people along Commercial Street exclaim, "See you at Tea!"

Townie – Perhaps in some locales, calling someone a "townie" is an insult – but not in Provincetown. Anyone born in Provincetown, usually called a native, is also a townie. How do you become a townie? That's unclear, but when the day arrives you'll know – as a townie usually tells you.

Washashore – This is a common term heard all over Cape Cod to describe anyone who wasn't born on the peninsula. A washashore can live on the Cape, or in Provincetown, long enough to become a townie. But if you weren't born on Cape Cod, you will always be a washashore.

Year-Rounder - A year-rounder is a person, regardless of being Washashore or Townie, who lives in Ptown throughout the year.





TRANSWEEK AND BEYOND:

PROVINCETOWN'S INEGACYOF INRANSINCION



Walk down Commercial Street and you may very well see a bumper sticker that reads "LGBT: The T Is No Longer Silent." That's long been the case in Provincetown, where transgender rights, culture, and expression are tightly woven into the fabric of the town. Throughout

the 20th century, many transgender and non-binary people moved to Provincetown for the safety and acceptance found at this remote beach town. But it was in 1975 when a thunderbolt of progress struck Provincetown with the first-ever Fantasia Fair, now TransWeek,

which would go on to become the longest-running transgender event in the world. Held every October, the event was founded by trans activist pioneers Betsy Shaw, Ari Kane, Betty Ann Lind, and Linda Franklin and included The Cherrystones, a Boston-based trans support group. The following year, the Fan Fair, as it was often called, launched the Outreach Institute for Gender Studies. And while the Fair was largely focused on heterosexual men who identified as cross-dressers, and their partners and families, from its inception, it was at the forefront of a variety of aspects of gender diversity. Various workshops and speakers covered everything from makeup to hormone therapy to what is now called gender affirming care. By the 1990s, the Fair attracted attendees from all over the world to Provincetown and grew to embrace the diversity of the transgender and non-binary community with programming that more accurately represented the spectrum of gender identities. Perhaps most importantly, TransWeek built a strong community. No one had to feel alone in their gender journey and could be comforted by the safety of Provincetown, a town that allowed people to be themselves fully.

Other trans events in other parts of the country would be held strictly within the confines of a hotel, a conference center, or a private home. But TransWeek allows connections to be made with cisgender people as well as with the straight, lesbian, gay, bisexual, non-binary and queer communities to build further understanding and to work towards becoming a united front for trans acceptance and equality. Attendees of TransWeek frequently share their affection for Provincetown, explaining that there are very few places in the world that fully embrace the trans community for as long as Provincetown has. Simply put, TransWeek is a big part of Provincetown's past, present, and future.

In addition to TransWeek, Provincetown is notable in transgender history in entertainment. Famed transgender activist and performer Christine Jorgensen came to town, performing frequently at the Pilgrim House, Crown & Anchor, and the Post Office Cabaret. Jorgensen became an international celebrity when she transitioned and traveled from the United States to Denmark in 1952 for what was then called a "sex change." She used the publicity her transition received to advocate for understanding and acceptance of transgender people. By the 1970, Jorgensen was fully ensconced in the jet set, traveling the world with her cabaret show that told the tale of her transition mixed with comedy and song, with the evening often ending with her dressed as Wonder Woman. She was always a hit whenever she came to Provincetown, and over the course of her many visits, she became close friends with other LGBTQ+ performers like Divine, Arthur Blake, and Charles Pierce. Provincetown also welcomed trans pioneer and Warhol Factory superstar Holly Woodlawn to town in the late 1970s and early 1980s when she appeared in productions of *The Neon Woman* and Women Behind Bars with Divine at the Pilgrim House.

Building on this history, trans visibility and representation are at an all-time high in Provincetown. You'll see the pink, blue, and white trans pride flag all over town, year-round. With the increased assault on transgender rights, many trans people, as well as families with trans children, are increasingly visiting and in some cases moving to Provincetown to escape anti-trans laws and attitudes spreading throughout the country. And the town is continually looking for ways to be more trans-inclusive.

- Culture Celebrating Provincetown's distinctive personality through retail shops, live performances, restaurants, galleries, and creative spaces.


In a time when LGBTQ+ rights face
